### What is quality?



DSS **contracts** disability support providers to do disability support services.




To **contract** means to pay people from outside an organisation to do a job.



Almost 50 thousand disabled people use disability support services each year.





- people can get very good quality disability supports
- disabled people and tāngata whaikaha Māori are kept safe from:
  - abuse which is when someone treats someone else badly
  - neglect which is when someone does not look after someone else when they should.









Here **quality** means things are very good for a long time.



High quality disability supports will make it more likely that good outcomes will happen for:









**Outcomes** are how things end up for people.




An outcome might be if people get better after medical treatment.



Having high quality disability supports means everyone gets the same good experience when using them.







- policies which are rules made by the government
- practices which are the things done to make a system work well.



High quality disability supports will be good value for money.



High quality disability supports will use the ideas in:

- Te Tiriti o Waitangi / the Treaty of Waitangi
- Enabling Good Lives



 the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities / UNCRPD.



Te Tiriti o Waitangi / Treaty of Waitangi is an important agreement between Māori and the Crown.



It is about Māori and the New Zealand Government making decisions together.



Choices

**Enabling Good Lives** is a disability support system that is about having:

- choice and control in your life
- the support you need and want
- a good life.





The United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with

Disabilities / UNCRPD is a law lots of countries have agreed to.

It says what governments must do to make sure disabled people get the same rights as everybody else.

This is so disabled people can have a good life.

### What is safeguarding?





Safeguarding protects the right of a disabled person to make their own decisions about their:

- life
- safety
- wellbeing.






### Wellbeing means things like:

- how you feel about yourself
- looking after your body with good food and exercise
- getting support when you are feeling sad or worried.







- abuse
- neglect
- violence
- harm.







Safeguarding is about making sure the risk is:

- looked out for
- responded to
- stopped.







Safeguarding is very important for disabled people if:

- they cannot keep themselves safe
- they are not getting their human rights
- they are at risk of:
  - o harm
  - o violence
  - o abuse
  - o neglect.


## How is DSS doing quality and safeguarding?

## **Disability Support Services**

DSS is working towards quality and safeguarding by doing things to:



• prevent





respond

develop.



These things will be explained on the next few pages.



### **Prevent**

We will work to stop problems from happening.



### **Identify**

We will work out what a problem is when it happens.



### Respond

We will do something when a problem is found.









### **Develop**

We will work out ways disability supports can be:

- made / put together
- made better.

We know there are gaps in quality and safeguarding:

- systems
- policies.

We want to:

- learn what the gaps are
- get better at what we do
- find ways to fix those gaps.



We are making a **framework** to make quality and safeguarding better.



Here **framework** means a system for checking that things are working as they should.
